County Raises Awareness for Victim Rights at 21st Annual Rally & Walk

Carlisle PA – The Cumberland County District Attorney’s Office tonight commemorated National Crime Victims’ Rights Week (April 24–30) with its 21st Annual Victims’ Rights Rally and One Mile Walk. This year’s theme is ***Rights, Access, Equity, for all victims*** and to help crime survivors find their justice. The event raises awareness about crime victims’ rights and provides victims information about resources and services available to them.
